Confession

Romans 8:6-11 To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. ⁷ For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law-- indeed it cannot, ⁸ and those who are in the flesh cannot please God. ⁹ But

you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. ¹⁰ But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. ¹¹ If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.

In addition to this reading from Paul's letter to the Romans, the lectionary today offers us John 11:1-45, the story of the raising of Lazarus. I haven't included it here because it's quite long, so I'll just give you a quick summary. But if you want to pause the video here and read it for yourself, you could do that now.

Still with me? OK – Lazarus was a friend of Jesus, and he became ill. His sisters, Martha and Mary, sent word to Jesus to tell him Lazarus was ill, and this message took some time to reach him. When he received the message, Jesus stayed where he was for two more days, before setting off for Lazarus' home in Bethany. By the time he got there, Lazarus had been dead and buried for four days. Both Martha and Mary remonstrated with Jesus "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." Jesus responds to Martha with those powerful words, which we use at the beginning of a funeral service. "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die."

It is perfectly natural, at the moment, if you're feeling scared. This is coming close – people we know are starting to fall ill. Sooner or later, one of them, perhaps many of them, are going to die. When that happens, we may very well be like Martha or Mary – where were you Jesus? If



you had been here, this would not have happened.

It's the age-old question - Where is God in the midst of suffering and fear and death? How can God let this happen? Did God cause this to happen?

Paul writes to the Romans that "To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace." The flesh means everything that is physical and material – our bodies, our food, our money, our human ways of doing things. And the Spirit is all that is of God – all that recognises God as creator, Saviour, Lord and giver of life. Of course, the material things are also of God, who made everything, but if we make them our focus, we risk losing sight of the God who made them. Paul describes this as hostility towards God.

Of course, we are worried about becoming ill, or the people we love becoming ill, and we may also be worried about those in our families who are losing income because of the current situation. But if we keep our minds there, on the material things, we will suffer, more than we need to suffer. Whereas if we keep our minds on the things of God, the things of the Spirit, we will find peace.

Where is God, when we suffer? He is there, right in the middle of it. It's natural to want to avoid suffering, of course we do. Sometimes we can but sometimes, we can't. Sometimes, the only way is through, trusting that God is by our side, holding our hand – no social distancing needed there! Jesus gave himself – he went through suffering, so that we could live according to the Spirit, rather than the flesh.

If we follow Paul's advice to the Romans and set our mind on the Spirit, then the Spirit will bring new life, in and through our pain. The exact shape and nature of that, we can't know. The key thing is to trust God.

Some years ago, David and I spent a week with the Iona Community, joining in the worship in the Abbey every morning and evening. The version of the Lord's Prayer that they use there contains one slight change, which has stayed with me. Where the traditional version says, "Lead us not into temptation" and the modern version in our Methodist Worship Book has "Save us from the time of trial", the Iona version runs: "Save us **in** the time of trial." There is a recognition that testing and tempting and suffering cannot be completely avoided. When we have no choice but to go through them, God is with us.

We should still, of course, do everything we can to avoid unnecessary suffering, both to ourselves and to others. Follow the rules, wash your hands and keep your distance, from all except God. Amen.
