THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

1st Reading Exodus 1:8-2:10

(New International Version)

⁸Then a new king, to whom Joseph meant nothing, came to power in Egypt. 9'Look,' he said to his people, 'the Israelites have become far too numerous for us. 10Come, we must deal shrewdly with them or they will become even more numerous and, if war breaks out, will join our enemies, fight against us and leave the country.' ¹¹So they put slave masters over them to oppress them with forced labour, and they built Pithom and Rameses as store cities for Pharaoh. 12But the more they were oppressed, the more they multiplied and spread; so the Egyptians came to dread the Israelites 13 and worked them ruthlessly. 14They made their lives bitter with harsh labour in brick and mortar and with all kinds of work in the fields; in all their harsh labour, the Egyptians worked them ruthlessly. ¹⁵The king of Egypt said to the Hebrew midwives, whose names were Shiphrah and Puah, 16'When you are helping the Hebrew women during childbirth on the delivery stool, if you see that the baby is a boy, kill him; but if it is a girl, let her live.' 17The midwives, however, feared God and did not do what the king of Egypt had told them to do; they let the boys live. ¹⁸Then the king of Egypt summoned the midwives and asked them, 'Why have you done this? Why have you let the boys live?'

¹⁹The midwives answered Pharaoh, 'Hebrew women are not like Egyptian women; they are vigorous and give birth before the midwives arrive.'

²⁰So God was kind to the midwives and the

people increased and became even more numerous. ²¹And because the midwives feared God, he gave them families of their own. ²²Then Pharaoh gave this order to all his people: 'Every Hebrew boy that is born you must throw into the Nile, but let every girl live.'

The birth of Moses

Gospel Matthew 16:13-20

(New International Version)

Peter declares that Jesus is the Messiah

¹³When Jesus came to the region of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say the Son of Man is?'

¹⁴They replied, 'Some say John the Baptist; others say Elijah; and still others, Jeremiah or one of the prophets.'

¹⁵ 'But what about you?' he asked. 'Who do you say I am?'

¹⁶Simon Peter answered, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.'

¹⁷Jesus replied, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah, for this was not revealed to you by flesh and blood, but by my Father in heaven. ¹⁸And I tell you that you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not overcome it. ¹⁹I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven; whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven.' ²⁰Then he ordered his disciples not to tell anyone that he was the Messiah.

Sermon

We read in Matthew 16:13-16: When Jesus had come into the districts of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, "Who do men say that the Son of Man is?" They said, "Some say John the Baptist, others Elijah, others Jeremiah, or one of the prophets." He said to them, "And you--who do you say that I am?" Simon Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God."

This passage is very significant as it is written in all 3 Gospels, all Gospels telling its own version of Peter's answer:

In Matthew - "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God."

In Mark (8:29) - "You are the Messiah"

In Luke (9:20) - "God's Messiah"

So why was it so important for Jesus to know how His disciples really thought who He was? Jesus was aware that His time on earth would be short and He needed as much time as possible to make it clear to His disciples, His mission and what that involved. Remember the disciples would be the first people to begin the early church and continue His great works to the ends of the earth.

According to the commentator, William Barclay it was interesting that they all withdrew to the districts of Caesarea Philippi because it was made up of a mainly non-Jewish population and Jesus would have had peace to teach the disciples there. Caesarea Philippi was about 25 miles north-east of the Sea of Galilee and so again travelling this distance shows the importance of Jesus Mission. Jesus was concerned to know who did recognise Him? and who would continue His work after He was gone? He needed to know that His 12 really understood who He was and to do that He had to test them?

This test however is not out of date, it applies to us today as Jesus followers as well. If Jesus asked you "Who do you say that I am?", are you whole-heartedly ready to answer. I don't mean to just call out who He is, but that in our hearts we truly know who He is? That our lives our mirrored by our deeds and actions and show others around us that we do know who Jesus is!

This Pandemic has actually been an opportunity for us all to show others that we do know who Jesus is. Neighbours have begun to make time for one another, whereas before we just passed one another on the street. Many people are watching services online, whereas before they didn't make time to go to Church. In general, people have been kinder towards one another.

Perhaps this is God's way of stripping away the things that distract us in our lives and present us with the opportunities to focus on loving one another. Afterall, that is what we should be doing!

When Jesus tested the disciples, He gently begins by finding out who others say He is. In verse 14 it reads "Some say John the Baptist; others say Elijah, and still others, Jeremiah or one of the prophets." By some saying Elijah, this spoke volumes in how the Disciples thought about Jesus as the were saying that Jesus was as great as the Old Testament prophets. They also thought that Jesus was the forerunner of the Messiah. "See, I will send the prophet Elijah to you before that great and dreadful day of the Lord comes" (Malachi 4:5).

At this point, after hearing the verdicts of the crowd, Jesus tests the disciples..." But what about you?" "Who do you say I am?" he asked. Jesus needs an answer that shows understanding. If we were to reflect on this question ourselves, how would you answer? Well I guess for the disciples this was one of those moments when you go quiet and do not say anything because you are afraid to get it wrong. I am sure we have all been in one of those situations, they can be quite awkward, you may even begin to sweat, roll the eyes, all signs of our body language showing we may be uncomfortable with the question.

Peter comes to the rescue, the disciple who denies knowing Jesus 3 times In Luke 22 v54-62. He shows Jesus understanding by answering in Matthew 16 v16 "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." Peter confesses that he knows exactly who Jesus is. This answer must have given Jesus reassurance that at least someone recognises who He is and the body of Christ – the Church is safe.

The verdict of the crowd and Peter's answer teaches us that when we answer Jesus question

"Who do you say I am?", its not giving an answer that show we know the great prophets that have come before Jesus but it is about knowing who He is. Are you able today, to say hand on heart that you know who Jesus Christ is? That you have that wonderful personal relationship with Him that allows Him to be in your every thought, word and action.

During this Pandemic has given me the opportunity to read many books. One book that I have read is by Bobby Schuller called 'You are beloved'. Within this book it explains how God loves us. When was the last time you were told that God loves you? If you have to think about this it probably suggests that we have neglected this fact and in sharing it with others. Bobby Schuller developed a creed, called the 'Creed of the Beloved' and you know when I read this, I couldn't get away from how powerful these words were. So when most of us were displaying rainbows in our windows during Lockdown, I took this time as an opportunity to display this creed. I stopped Bin men, Postmen and passersby from their tasks as they took a few moments to read it. My neighbours commented positively about it as well. I would like to share that creed with you now...



I hope today you can say "I am the beloved of God. It's who I am". I know this creed has given

me comfort and certainty in the uncertain times we are living in.

Just as Peter knows who Jesus is and that he is the beloved of God, Jesus replies in v17 "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah, for this was not revealed to you by flesh and blood, but by my Father in heaven. And I tell you that you are Peter, and on this rock, I will build my Church, and the gates of Hades will not overcome it. I will give you the keys of heaven, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven."

In Greek the name for Peter is 'Petros' and the name for rock is 'Petra'. Peter was given the task to build the Church. Peter is the first stone of this foundation and as Christians we continue to add to the Church of Christ.

In the week ahead, hopefully you will find opportunities to tell God and others who He is and to share about how much God loves each one of us.
