1st Reading Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16 (NIVUK)

The covenant of circumcision

¹When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the Lord appeared to him and said, 'I am God Almighty; walk before me faithfully and be blameless. ²Then I will make my covenant between me and you and will greatly increase your numbers.'

³Abram fell face down, and God said to him, ⁴'As for me, this is my covenant with you: you will be the father of many nations. ⁵No longer will you be called Abram; your name will be Abraham, for I have made you a father of many nations. ⁶I will make you very fruitful; I will make nations of you, and kings will come from you. ⁷I will establish my covenant as an everlasting covenant between me and you and your descendants after

¹⁵God also said to Abraham, 'As for Sarai your wife, you are no longer to call her Sarai; her name will be Sarah. ¹⁶I will bless her and will surely give you a son by her. I will bless her so that she will be the mother of nations; kings of peoples will come from her.'

Epistle Romans 4:13-25 (NIVUK)

¹³It was not through the law that Abraham and his offspring received the promise that he would be heir of the world, but through the righteousness that comes by faith. ¹⁴For if those who depend on the law are heirs, faith means nothing and the promise is worthless, ¹⁵because the law brings wrath. And where there is no law there is no transgression.

it may be by grace and may be guaranteed to all Abraham's offspring—not only to those who are of the law but also to those who have the faith of Abraham. He is the father of us all. ¹⁷As it is written: "I have made you a father of many nations." He is our father in the sight of God, in whom he believed—the God who gives life to the dead and calls into being things that were not.

¹⁸Against all hope, Abraham in hope believed and so became the father of many nations, just as it had been said to him, "So shall your offspring be." ¹⁹Without weakening in his faith, he faced the fact that his body was as good as dead—since he was about a hundred years old—and that Sarah's womb was also dead. ²⁰Yet he did not waver through unbelief regarding the promise of God, but was strengthened in his faith and gave glory to God, ²¹being fully persuaded that God had power to do what he had promised. ²²This is why "it was credited to

him as righteousness." ²³The words "it was credited to him" were written not for him alone, ²⁴but also for us, to whom God will credit righteousness—for us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead. ²⁵He was delivered over to death for our sins and was raised to life for our justification.

Gospel Mark 8:31-38 (NIVUK)

³¹He then began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and after three days rise again. ³²He spoke plainly about this, and Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him.

³³But when Jesus turned and looked at his disciples, he rebuked Peter. "Get behind me, Satan!" he said. "You do not have in mind the concerns of God, but merely human concerns."

³⁴Then he called the crowd to him along with his disciples and said: "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ³⁵For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me and for the gospel will save it. ³⁶What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? ³⁷Or what can anyone give in exchange for their soul? ³⁸If anyone is ashamed of me and my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, the Son of Man will be ashamed of them when he comes in his Father's glory with the holy angels."

Sermon

A Lenten journey of faith with Jesus Christ

Although you'll be hearing or reading my sermon on 28th February I had to submit the script for it 10 days ago so I hope you will understand my lockdown frame of mind. At that date of course we were all still

waiting for the government to give us hope of relief from the restrictions.

I guess we all know the expression 'Groundhog Day'; indeed many people have said to me that one day seems to run into another during this long and dreary winter and each one seems very similar. Even people who have been working from home have got into a rut simply repeating the same sort of daily routine.

How have you found it I wonder? Have you had difficulty with planning forward for the future when up until very recently there has been no sign of an ending? How has your concentration been when there has been little incentive to get things finished; and what about motivation to take on new challenges and make changes in your life?

Well I for one have certainly struggled in all of these areas and although I have had a long list of jobs to do I just don't seem to have got round to them until forced to at the last possible moment. It's called procrastination of course and so there I was again panicking about finishing my script for today having had weeks to prepare!

On top of all of this monotony and inertia came the realisation too that Lent was upon us as I sat down on Shrove Tuesday to put my thoughts together. Yes Lent, for me a time contemplation looking back at my own shortcomings and making new vows to repent and change my life. After 3 lockdowns you'd have thought that I'd have had enough time to do all of that already; but I suppose I had been putting it off once again waiting for Lent to force my hand!

So now today here we are already 11 days into Lent turning from the wilderness of lockdown only to find ourselves spending 40 days in a spiritual wilderness confronting our demons and reflecting upon our lives as Christians so far. During this time we take a good look at ourselves and think about what the future might hold for us as we strive anew to get a better understanding of God's will for us; How might we make changes and live out our lives in the light of Christ.

It would be easy to be very introspective during this time and become embroiled in past regrets but there is a brighter and more positive side to Lent if we look more closely at today's reading. At first sight Jesus pronounces what sounds like disastrous news and makes very serious demands of his followers.

There is the shock of hearing him declare the certainty of his future suffering and death although only he understands the full impact and consequences of this. But then he addresses all those around him looking for fresh commitment well beyond what they might have expected.

What must they have thought when he turned to them saying 'if anyone would come after me he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me and for the gospel will save it!' For his audience then something like 'what on earth am I letting myself in for' might have been a fair reaction I think!

Now on a normal day to day scale I guess many of us can recall feelings of great trepidation and yet excitement as we have made a step change in our lives. Perhaps committing to a new relationship, getting married, starting a family; setting off to university in a distant town; changing jobs or embarking on a long journey with no fixed destination. Amongst these examples I'm sure that many of us could recall such feelings or be able to visualise how it might have felt.

When we reflect upon Jesus words today we can see that he was inviting his disciples and followers then to make a step change in their way of life too. And it was one that sounded very dramatic and full of danger as he talked about them joining him on a journey which involved them losing their lives and yet finding a new life too. Talk about risk and uncertainty – in our regulated and risk averse western way of life such a thing is very hard to countenance.

But the reality is that the offer is still there and Jesus is calling out to us today just as forcefully as he was then! That message to deny ourselves and take up our cross and follow him is a challenge that many of us consider at this time of year although we often express our response symbolically by giving up the likes of chocolate, treats, luxuries or whatever until Easter comes whilst at the same time we do try and be better people too.

Now I'm not decrying such endeavours by any means but just to put things in perspective <u>Jesus call goes</u> way beyond that demanding a complete change of attitude and way of life that gets to the core of being a Christian or follower of Jesus. The life we are losing or giving up is the one that has been holding us back from being true followers of Jesus and wholeheartedly living out the gospel in every aspect of our lives He is calling us to a new life striving to live and act like him without fear of the consequences.

Yes, there will be a lot of apprehension and uncertainty as we tread along this new path but Jesus will be there alongside us as we play our part in building The Kingdom of God right here on earth ready for his eventual return. This is not doom and gloom or a miserable way of life leading to disaster to which he is calling us. Although our cross may be hard to bear at times the prize is the glory of Christ's presence for eternity.

So will we join him on this exciting journey into a new way of life as champions of justice and the Christian Gospel, full of grace, full of mercy, full of love and full of hope? How much better does Lent feel now as we cast off our old lives, our old values, our old attitudes and spend our time of contemplation looking forward to a new reinvigorated way of life with Jesus at our side as our guide and comfort on our journey of faith. Amen
