Jesus Appears to the Disciples

¹⁹When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' ²⁰After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. ²¹Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' ²²When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.'

Jesus and Thomas

²⁴But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came.
²⁵So the other disciples told him, 'We have seen

the Lord.' But he said to them, 'Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe.'

²⁶A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' ²⁷Then he said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe.' ²⁸Thomas answered him, 'My Lord and my God!' ²⁹Jesus said to him, 'Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe.'

³⁰Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. ³¹But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

Sermon

Welcome! I hope that you are enjoying our service on this, the second Sunday of Easter. You'll see from the background behind me that I'm recording this from my kitchen dining room, sat at our dining table. For us as a family, an important place; a place where we meet together, eat together and share stories together. It is around this table that we hear what has happened to each of us in the day. Or we plan what is going to happen in the day ahead. It is a place of gathering, of hearing stories and planning new ones.

Easter is the time of endings and beginnings. It is, of course, the end of Jesus's life. It is about his death on the cross and through that death all that Jesus has done and won for us. As our reading from the letter of John reminds us, Jesus's death on the cross is the all-atoning sacrifice. It makes all of us, each and every one of us, whoever we are, wherever we are, whatever we've done, whatever we fail to do; all of the good, bad, everything - regardless of all of that; all of us are loved by God, and loved so much that Jesus gave his life to show us the depths of that infinite, all-encompassing love.

Easter is about the beginning of his resurrected ministry. A ministry of continuing to bring good news to the disciples and after the Ascension the giving of the Holy Spirit that brings good news to all, has brought news since it first fell upon the church, and a Spirit who continues to breathe life and bring good news into the church today.

It is the beginning of a new relationship with God.

Yet we only know about this because people who were present at the time, couldn't stop talking about it. Even when authorities told them to be quiet, shut up, stop going on about Jesus coming back from the dead, they just couldn't stop going on about Jesus returning from the dead. It is only because of that, that we have the stories of the resurrection, one of which we heard this this morning – John's account of Jesus appearing to the disciples but Thomas being absent. Thomas refusing to believe unless he saw, unless he put his hands, unless he experienced the presence of Christ with his own being, he was not going to believe. Sometimes we think of Thomas as being doubting. I am thankful that Thomas doubted, for all those occasions that I, and I'm sure many others in the church, and many other Ministers have doubted; for those times when our humanity says but this isn't possible and yet God says anything is possible. And so Thomas refuses

to believe until he has seen, he has heard, he has placed his hands, and then, wow! what a transformation – he goes from doubting to truly believing that Jesus is the Messiah and has been raised from the dead.

That leads this early Church community to keep on telling and retelling and telling again the story of the love of God, that looks like defeat – and yet snatches victory for all time and all people.

Yes you.

Whoever you are watching this. Whether church is normal for you, whether church is an abstract idea for you, whether church is a place you go because your friends are, whether you have ever set foot in church in your life, or never have and never plan to - this story of the resurrection of the Son of God is for you. It is for you to hear that God loves you so much that he gave his only son. It is for you to hear that makes all things right between you and God. It is for you to hear that the resurrection of Christ was to bring life, new life, to each and every one of us. It is the good news that isn't just for this life but shows us that even after death there is good news for us and for all people – for we have the promise of resurrection in Christ.

Yet with that knowledge comes an expectation. In the reading from the letter of John, we hear that this is a declaration that John seeks to declare for all to hear of the good news of Christ. In the reading from acts we hear that the apostles are giving their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord. They can't stop talking about it. And we're called to be the same, to keep on going on about all that God has done for us and for everyone. If we stop talking, the stones will start shouting.

And so our readings point not only to all that Christ has done, but to that which is expected of us – to tell good news. To testify to the world around us that Jesus Christ, the human who is divine, the very son of God, - God in our form – went to a cross to die for us; that in death he defeated the powers of hell and death; of Satan and all that could be against us; once and for all; and he's raised from the dead.

That 'keeping going on' is the call to the Church today. To keep retelling the story of Christ's resurrection and of our experiences of God. And so I invite you to take a few moments and to ponder where, where have you experienced God in this week since Easter; where might you have seen God at work, or where have you seen others pointing to the good news that God is with us.

Feel free to pause this video and take as long as you need to think, 'where have I seen God?'

Not only do the disciples recognize that Jesus Christ is God, the resurrected God, but they testify to that knowledge – they tell their stories to other people. And so I invite you, maybe with your friends, maybe with family, maybe on a blog or a FaceBook post maybe on twitter – wherever and to whoever it feels comfortable to you – I invite you to share your story. Having pondered where you have seen God at work, I invite you to share that story with somebody else. It doesn't have to be perfect, it doesn't need to be church words, it can be stilted and strange and not quite do it justice. I invite you to share that story, think of who you could share with.

Maybe you pondered the question of where you have seen God, and thought, 'I'm not sure I've seen God anywhere this week it's been a rough week'; or 'it's been a difficult time'; or 'I just haven't had time – the children have been off, I've been trying to work and they've been playing'; or 'with lockdown just being eased slowly so I've been able to get out and I've not really had time to sit' or 'I'm not sure about my relationship with God was I meant to find God'. If that is you and you don't have that story to share – listen out. Listen to the stories of others, ponder what they have heard, what they have seen, and pray that God opens your eyes and your heart to finding a new story with God. A story of new life and new birth.

It is a wonderful story, this story of Easter that the immortal God should give of God's self for us. I pray if you haven't yet found this story, that you read it; and I pray within your reading that it comes alive for you as it came alive for Thomas. If you have found this story, I pray that it is so alive for you that like the disciples and the early Church you find ways to express it in words, in actions, maybe in paintings and art, in poetry and music; however you can express it, I pray you find that way. I pray that you just can't stop talking about it, showing it, sharing it with the world around you.

The wonderful news of Easter is: He is risen! Hallelujah! Amen!
