

Worship for 2nd Sunday of Advent (complete text. A video version is also online) Keep safe. Keep caring. Keep praying.

Welcome to all of you joining us for our service on the second Sunday in Advent. As we start a new Plan we have a slightly different format, with fewer contributors. I am Anne Oliver, your worship leader for today; our Bible readings will be provided by the Rev. Audrey Simpson and Tim Pearson, and the Rev. David Greenwood will be sharing his reflections on God's Word. We hope that you will feel that God has spoken to you through this worship, and I thank those whose technical expertise has made it possible.

If we were worshipping in a church building we would be lighting an Advent candle to remember the prophets who prepared the way for the Messiah's coming; let's come together in fellowship as I light this candle here today.

Gospel

Mark 1:1-8 (NRSVA)

The Proclamation of John the Baptist

¹The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

²As it is written in the prophet Isaiah,

'See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way;

³the voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

"Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight",

⁴John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. ⁶Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. ⁷He proclaimed, 'The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. ⁸I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.'

Sermon

One of the things I miss, living here in Warwickshire, is the hills. Growing up in Lancashire on the south side of Rochdale, we could look out across a bowling green and then beyond across the whole of the town. We could the spire of the town hall; we could see the sixties blocks of flats – the Seven Sisters – and beyond that, looking north-west we could see the hills of the Rossendale upland and above them all, Knowle Hill rising. If I'd been able to look the other way, but the house would be in the way, I'd have seen the bigger hills and the moors of the Pennines, surrounded by countryside. And by countryside, I don't mean the lovely stone of the Cotswolds, I don't mean the thatched cottages, I don't mean the lovely fields. Instead I mean the bleak, bare, open moorland where paths could lead you into the middle of a peat bog and disappear; where the mist could drop with no notice. Countryside that was wild and dangerous and had to be treated with respect.

A bit like the Judaean wilderness – even more dangerous, even more to be treated with respect. And a voice was heard in that wilderness, crying 'Prepare the way of the Lord'. Saying that every valley shall be raised and the mountains and the hills brought low. And as I was growing up in Rochdale, they decided to build a motorway though those hills and on a Sunday every few months in the early seventies, we'd have a trip out – up the narrow roads into the Pennines and there we would see this huge gash in the mountainside as millions of tonnes of rock were moved out to carve a passage for the road, and then dropped in the next valley to block it up – to raise it up to be the same level. And I remember in the early seventies just before the M62 opened, we took a trip from school in a coach onto a motorway that wasn't open. And we got out on one of those new bridges with steep-sided slopes of a valley and looked across to Hollingworth Lake. And then we drove a little further and there was the new dam at Scammonden, and we could see the reservoir beginning to fill and beyond it was this huge gap where the mountain had been, and above it, this great concrete arch carrying a little road that used to travel on the ground, but the ground was no longer there. And the mountain was brought low, and the valley was raised to prepare the way.

And now you can drive, as you have done for the last forty-odd years from Leeds to Manchester. And in the blink of an eye you will pass under that concrete arch, you will pass through that gap in the mountains that's no longer there, you will pass over that dam at Scammonden; and you'll take it for granted and you will forget the years of preparation, of planning, of carving out, of building. Just like we take for granted the preparation of John the Baptist, preparing for Jesus who would follow. We forget the preparation of the prophets – we wheel them out from time to time – it's nice to have a bit of Isaiah at the beginning of a carol service, 'For unto us a Son is born, unto us a Son is given. And his name will be Wonderful-Counsellor, Mighty God'. But it's taken for granted, we go straight for the main course.

We don't think that we might be called to be John the Baptist too. Here we are, in the wilderness of 2020, confined to our own homes, not seeing family, getting used to the joys and otherwise of Zoom and Skype, not seeing our sisters and brothers in Christ but watching me here on YouTube. And maybe, in the wilderness of 2020, it's us who are called to be the voice, crying 'Prepare the way of the Lord'. To bring hope and peace into people's lives; even though we can't see them and meet them; in a phone call, in a Christmas card, in a letter, in a smile to the people who are dropping things off at the door, the way we greet our neighbours and our friends when we accidentally meet them on the street; to say this is the season of hope. That we prepare the way for the coming of the Prince of Peace. The prophet's voice still calls to us down the centuries: 'Wild and lone the prophet's voice echoes through the desert still, calling us to make a choice, bidding us to do God's will'.

- With such preaching stark and bold John proclaimed salvation near, and his timeless warnings hold words of hope to all who hear. So we dare to journey on, led by faith through ways untrod, till we come at last like John to behold the Lamb of God.
