1st Reading 1 Kings 17:7-16 (NRSVA)

⁷But after a while the wadi dried up, because there was no rain in the land.

The Widow of Zarephath

8 Then the word of the LORD came to him, saying, ⁹'Go now to Zarephath, which belongs to Sidon, and live there; for I have commanded a widow there to feed you.' ¹⁰So he set out and went to Zarephath. When he came to the gate of the town, a widow was there gathering sticks; he called to her and said, 'Bring me a little water in a vessel, so that I may drink.' ¹¹As she was going to bring it, he called to her and said, 'Bring me a morsel of bread in your hand.' ¹²But she said, 'As the LORD your God lives, I have nothing baked, only a handful of meal in a jar, and a little oil in a jug; I am now gathering a couple of sticks, so that I may go home and prepare it for myself and my son, that we may eat it, and die.' ¹³Elijah said to her, 'Do not be afraid; go and do as you have said; but first make me a little cake of it and bring it to me, and afterwards make something for yourself and your son. ¹⁴For thus says the LORD the God of Israel: The jar of meal will not be emptied and the jug of oil will not fail until the day that the LORD sends rain on the earth.' ¹⁵She went and did as Elijah said, so that she as well as he and her household ate for many days. ¹⁶The jar of meal was not emptied, neither did the jug of oil fail, according to the word of the LORD that he spoke by Elijah.

Gospel John 21: 1-14 (NRSVA)

21After these things Jesus showed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and he showed himself in this way. ²Gathered there together were Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples. ³Simon Peter said to them, 'I am going fishing.' They said to him, 'We will go with you.' They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

4 Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. ⁵Jesus said to them, 'Children, you have no fish, have you?' They answered him, 'No.' ⁶He said to them, 'Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some.' So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. ⁷That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord!' When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the lake. ⁸But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off.

9 When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. ¹⁰Jesus said to them, 'Bring some of the fish that you have just caught.' ¹¹So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred and fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. ¹²Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, 'Who are you?' because they knew it was the Lord. ¹³Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. ¹⁴This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.

Sermon

"Come and have breakfast" John 21.12

Not many people would have recognised this quiet man. In later years he would drive down to the supermarket from his small house in Pinehurst, North Carolina, load up with a nod from some people and a word from others and head home. But the traffic cop would give him a salute.

Yet this man gave generous practical help to millions of hungry people after a world crisis. General George Catlett Marshall gave his name to the aid plan which re-established Western Europe after the Second World War. Ernest Bevin described it as 'A lifeline to a sinking man'.

The disciples did not recognise Jesus as the man standing on the lakeside. Was it the early morning mist or smoke from a fire which obscured him? But they could hear his invitation. "Come and have breakfast".

Do you like breakfast? I've always been a 'go to work on an egg' man with cereals - and bacon too until recently. Sets you up for the day. However I've never been a night shift worker, tired and super hungry.

The fishermen had toiled all night. They were doubtless shattered and ravenous; absolutely ready for breakfast. And at the last moment after this man had thrown 'a lifeline to sinking hearts', they had a huge haul of fish to heave on board.

All they had been doing was to try to get back to normal. Back to the family in Galilee. Back to the old days of work, after an unexpected crisis when their leader was crucified and they were locked up afraid in Jerusalem. So they went back to fishing. We might say back to the factory, shop, office, restaurant – whatever the job was. You know the feeling after lockdown? Except that nothing was going to plan. Even the fish were being awkward. Surely they were down hearted? You know that too?

Now Jesus appears and knows their needs – and responds.

First he guides them to a successful outcome from their labours: a catch to meet the needs of their families, and the whole village.

Then secondly, nourishment for themselves. Did they lick their lips as they spotted the choicest fish in the net? How hungry they must have felt as they staggered ashore, smelling cooking fish and seeing bread.

Peter may have remembered the time that Jesus and he went to Jairus' house where his daughter had died. After Jesus had commanded her back to life, she got up at once and started walking around – just as a twelve year old would, wouldn't they? And Jesus had spotted her need, <u>her</u> hunger after the lock-down of death. His response then? "Give her something to eat." Now it was food for Peter himself.

Not least, thirdly, Jesus knows the need of Peter and the disciples for encouragement. These men may well have been asking "how long?" They thought that they had met the risen Jesus but he kept disappearing. Now he is with them again and their hearts are lifted. They know for sure it is him.

Christ knows <u>our</u> needs now: needs for reassurance and strength. Here's the good news. Before we recognise him, his grace comes to each one of us. We affirm during the baptism of young children:

'For you Jesus Christ lived, showed God's love and triumphed over death;

For you he prays at God's right hand:

All this for you, before you could know anything of it'

Our Old Testament reading today told of a despairing widow, preparing for a final Brunch. However she makes a leap of faith about her store of flour and oil, which prove to be sufficient for her family and Elijah.

The Iguaza Falls in Argentina are the largest in South America. Yet behind this immense sheet of water Great Dusky Swifts have their nests. When the chicks are grown, the only way that they can take to the skies to have life is right through the waterfall. They have

to make a flight of faith to get their first breakfasts, so to speak, in a world which they have not known previously.

There are times when <u>we</u> have to make a leap of faith to receive that all-sufficiency that God offers. To get the Full-English (or Scottish) breakfast for the time ahead. Times like now, perhaps, when it is so difficult to foresee the next year. But take heart. Christ knows our needs and he will shower us with the blessings we require. We shall find spiritual nourishment coming to us in fresh ways as we worship differently.

Paul found God's grace flowing when life seemed bleak. He wrote: 'The Lord said to me, "My grace is sufficient".'

Sufficient for the disciples. Sufficient for Paul. Sufficient for us. Grace enough for all. Christ's call is to <u>us</u> as well as the disciples: "Come - and have breakfast".

But it wasn't the end of that breakfast story was it.

Jesus was cooking a meal. It is the only occasion when we are told of him himself catering, though perhaps he helped his mother as a child. On other occasions it was others catering. The story of Martha slaving for Jesus' group in the Bethany kitchen is well known. When Jairus' daughter was raised, her father and mother were asked to get her some food.

Now it is Peter's turn to help. "Bring some of the fish you have just caught." And after they had eaten, Jesus says "Feed my lambs; feed my sheep". Peter is invited to share in Jesus' ministry.

What about us? Jesus seeks our help too. What food are we sharing? And I do not mean just the bread and wine of communion, though that is important. At this time of national challenge by the Coronavirus there is scope for sharing both physical food and food for our Christian relationships.

We know that more people are turning to food banks as their income is reduced or the children are unable to get school meals. In the UK over 4 million people know the reality of hunger. At the same time gifts of food have become more awkward to pass on to the banks. Jesus responded to hungry people.

As for food for our souls, we have new opportunities through the internet to add to previous ways of sharing. Websites for worship, group meetings on line and social media chat all add to the older ways of telephoning, texting, writing or speaking at a 'social distance'. And by no means least, praying. In whatever way we can, Christ wants us to share in the distribution of his loving care – his food. So we are called to work with both food banks and the like and with spiritual food for struggling people. He delights in using us to share God's love.

Are you feeling like those disciples did: excluded from normality, or locked down from human contact, or discontented and hungry? Perhaps with sad memories this Remembrance Day. I want to share this good news with you.

God knows our deepest feelings and responds enabling his grace to envelope us. His love and grace are sufficient to strengthen hearts and minds whatever our situation.

But He knows our bodily needs too. Through Christ, he inspires our hands to share with one another our 'fish' of food and friendship so that his sheep may not be hungry.

Jesus came so that we might have life and have it to the full. Each of us is invited: "Come and have breakfast".

Let us share this meal with one another, so that all may live the coming days in His grace. Amen
