Sermon

We are well and truly in the season of Epiphany now which of course is a time of revelation.

Today in our Gospel reading we have heard more of the long-prophesied pronouncements of John the Baptist who not only calls for repentance and cleansing baptism in The Jordan River but admits that his baptism by water is only in fact preparation for the true baptism by one who follows him and will baptize all with The Holy Spirit and fire.

This is the first revelation of Jesus Christ as a fully-grown man but not just any man! Here is the true likeness of God in essence, nature and spirit represented in the form of a human being. God has put himself on display and confirms this with his booming voice “this is my son with whom I am well pleased”. As if this wasn’t enough all present saw something in bodily form ‘like a dove’ alighting on Jesus’ shoulder, indeed the Holy Spirit.

How wonderful would it be today if we were able to witness the Holy Spirit in this way! Well I guess many of us have been in situations where something has occurred and we have detected a tangible presence of something that we can’t explain or prove but we know that something has taken place outside of our normal range of senses.

I can remember myself returning from business abroad to learn that my father had died whilst I was away. I prayed and sobbed alone beside myself with grief and guilt that I was not there when he passed but then strangely I felt a light touch on my shoulder and a shiver ran up my spine. At the time I thought it was my father reaching out to comfort me but later I realised that it was something else and I thanked God.

Yes the Holy Spirit I believe is with us and within us throughout our lives!

By that I am not generally talking about mind or soul bending experience with heavenly choirs

and flashing lights although I accept that some may be fortunate enough to experience something along these lines. I am not talking about miraculous events changing our lives once and for all for the better although again there may be some who have experienced this

For most of the time we are not fully aware of his presence and we don’t have the tangible signs or sensory feelings to prove it or to remind us. It is hard to imagine that the Spirit though is trying to communicate with us offering guidance, sustenance, protection, motivation and yet peaceful rest. Not like the proverbial genie in a lamp though waiting for our instant wishes and commands. The potential relationship that we have within us has to be nurtured through prayer and reflection.

However once that relationship is established the Holy Spirit is most certainly a refuge in time of dire need and brings the word of God straight into our hearts and minds.

In my own case maybe I was expecting the Spirit to make the first move proactively coercing me to change direction in life in ways that I had never contemplated; maybe I was expecting my good fortune in life to grow even more so; maybe I was expecting a voice in my head or more taps on my shoulder but it wasn’t like that.

Almost imperceptibly though I notice that life was getting more difficult to deal with. Family conflicts; bereavements; difficulty with decisions and actions at work; how to exercise authority to motivate and guide others yet with humility; how to make very uncomfortable and distressing decisions in my personal life. Facing up to new challenges like preaching a sermon in front of people who probably knew the bible much better than me;

But I found the Holy Spirit within me! Not that I myself was any wiser or cleverer or more perceptive but within me there was a counsellor, a comforter when I was down, someone to wrestle with but at the same time a voice of reason, a purveyor of compassion and love, a demonstrator of humility, a measure of wisdom and discernment.

However this came with a conscience that screamed at me when I contemplated transgression or hurt; an irritating pin that pricked me when hypocritical thoughts entered my head and an uncomfortable sadness when I let myself and my saviour down.

We each will have our unique relationship with the Holy Spirit and have to find out how to live with The Spirit within us; how can we sustain its presence; how dare we approach it; how can we reconcile that possessing The Spirit does not give us special powers to be used in our own interest or to assert our own position or status; how we can reconcile the fact that possession is an invitation to live in humility and love rejecting power and domination. How can we perceive that The Spirit within us is to be used for the benefit of those outside us transforming their lives for the better and convincing them of faith in Christ?

Well fine words and intentions to be applied in all walks, moods and moments of life. A coping mechanism that outweighs all difficulties and setbacks, outranks purchased pleasure with heartfelt joy and love. It doesn't start off like this but grows and develops and will never be finished for our relationship with God is but work in progress. But it can develop and blossom within us as we cling on to our faith stumbling along the path of life receiving cuts and bruises along the way and learning some hard lessons.

At this stage you might say well Malcolm I've been baptized in my church and I therefore have the Holy Spirit within me and that is that! Well I agree but whilst baptism is essential to awaken the God given Spirit within us it is only the start of a long road.

As we progress together through the biblical life of Jesus in the coming year let's see how the Holy Spirit was manifested in his life and maybe compare that with our own life experiences.....
