THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

1<sup>st</sup> Reading

Jeremiah 22:1-5

This is what the LORD says: "Go down to the palace of the king of Judah and proclaim this message there:

'Hear the word of the LORD to you, king of Judah, you who sit on David's throne—you, your officials and your people who come through these gates. This is what the LORD says: Do what is just and right. Rescue from the hand of the oppressor the one who has been robbed. For if you are careful to carry out these commands, then kings who sit on David's throne will come through the gates of this palace, riding in chariots and on horses, accompanied by their officials and their people. Talk about Action for Children's work

Lyle's story

Lyle (whose name has been changed to protect his identity) was physically and emotionally abused by his parents. They punched and kicked him, and he'd often go hungry. After turning to alcohol to numb the pain, Lyle ran away from home. Action for Children stepped in to find him a safe and stable place to live.

"Drugs were always a big problem in my family and there was a lot of violence," Lyle explains. "I wasn't fed at home and my big sister would sneak food into her room most nights. But we'd often go days without getting food." Lyle was left to fend for himself after his parents threw his sister out. "I didn't have clean clothes. Mum and dad wouldn't let me bath or shower. I wasn't even allowed to get my hair cut," he says. After getting bullied at school, Lyle started to isolate himself. At 14, he started drinking. "Mum and dad would offer me alcohol all the time, and eventually I said yes. I'd get home from school and they'd give me glasses of things. I'd just drink them. I couldn't feel anything. I thought nothing bad could ever happen when I was drunk."

Lyle left school and found a job he really liked. But things at home got even worse. "I loved my job. But I was the only one putting money in the house. And if I didn't give the money to them for drugs, they'd take it out on me." Lyle's depression and anxiety started to take their toll. "I just knew I had to get out," he says. "I left that house with nothing apart from the clothes on my back. I was in a really bad state. I came to Action for Children with nothing." Action for Children found Lyle a safe place to live in supported accommodation. "They reminded me that I'm enough," he says. "They helped me recover from alcohol. Without them, I don't think I'd be alive.

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I nearly took my own life and, if it hadn't been for my support worker coming and just talking to me, I wouldn't be here."

Reflection

#### Sermon

Good morning Church! I hope you are enjoying the service this morning that has been brought and presented to you by a group of young people that I am delighted to be able to spend Wednesday nights with. This group of young people have been on such an amazing journey over the last couple of years and on this Action for Children Sunday we hope that the message and the passion that we want to share our service with you has been received and been a blessing to you.

I want to talk to us on this Action for Children Sunday, that is all about choosing childhood, about choosing spiritual childhood, and revisiting it. I think that it's important as we look at how we can help children around the world, we also need to help people who are children in their faith. And that is what I want to talk to you a little bit about this morning.

I would like to just examine a couple of examples of children from the bible. The first one is Samuel. Samuel, when he was initially called by God, responded with a very simple phrase which he was taught by Eli to say: 'Speak, Lord, your servant is listening'. And what's important about that, is that it's very childlike in the way it approaches God. It doesn't come with its own agenda or its own list of requests, it just comes wanting to learn. And I encourage people to see God like a child sees their parent. A child who idolises, to an extent, their dad by making him their hero or their mum by making her their heroine and sees the adult as someone to emulate and to follow. And I think that sometimes we come to God in our very busy lives with a list of requests that we'd like him to

do for us and without stopping to learn from him by talking to him as a child would their very learned father. I can very obviously accept that God is much more wise and knowledgeable than me, and therefore his wisdom is something that I would seek to get at every available opportunity.

The second child is the child at the feeding of the five thousand. And again what I love about this is that we spend a lot of time focussing on Jesus and focussing on the miracle, but we don't spend enough time focussing on the child. And this morning I would like to encourage you to look at the child and look at what he does which is that he brings this small basket of bread and fish, and what he does is he presents it to Jesus and says: 'All that I have, I give to you if you can help others by it'. And it's so simple and so childlike but actually it's something that we sometimes miss – that actually if we just bring what we have and ask God to do the rest, it can produce amazing miracles such as the feeding of the five thousand. There's a great song by Keith Green that's called 'He'll take care of the rest' and if you've got time today, have a listen to it and it's humorous in the way that it's put together as a lot of Keith Green's songs were, but it's so powerful in the way it talks about how actually, you just bring what you have and God does the rest and it's not up to you.

So I implore you with these things in mind, not to think of us as having to do church in a certain way. One of the positives that has come out of this very negative situation of the Covid 19 lockdown is that we've been forced into thinking outside of the box and creating new ways of doing church and new ways of doing life, and new ways of living in a relationship with God. It's made us be more forward thinking, the NHS for example has grown about 15 years in 3 weeks at the start of this lockdown because it had to catch up technology-wise with where it needed to be. And its important that we continue to pursue church in a way that allows other people to get

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involved and pursue their relationship with God in new and exciting ways.

We've read two readings this morning the first one is about Jesus going to Nazareth and how he wasn't accepted in his own town. And what I find myself struggling with at times as I've read this a couple of times over the last six months, is that I wonder whether young people nowadays, feel accepted in their own church. I think that sometimes we include young people in services in a way that we think feels nice, but I'm wondering how that's perceived by them and whether it's perceived in the way that we think it is. I believe that our role as members of the Christian faith who are more advanced in years is to encourage young people to step out in faith and not to hide their faith or wait until they are older – but that they can step out now. And actually that's borne out all across scripture, that actually you should remember your creator in the days of your youth as Ecclesiastes says, and I think that we have a responsibility to make church more friendly to people who are trying to reason and think through and work out with fear and trembling sometimes, as the bible says, their faith in God. I believe that we need to put a focus on this going forward and that actually we can treat the current lockdown as a wake-up call that not everybody sees things the way that we do. This is borne out by further in our other reading where we are called to be a porthole for the foreigner, and the fatherless and the widow and we do a great job of trying to be there for all of those people in a literal sense, but I wonder about people who are a foreigner to our faith. If you walked into your church never having experienced a relationship with God before, or never having experienced a relationship with God through Jesus before sometimes, whether it would feel alien and whether it would feel like you could engage.

So maybe those are things to think about. Maybe we should focus as we come out of this lockdown, on choosing spiritual childhood on choosing to revisit when our relationship with God was simply trying to discover more about him and trying to emulate him and trying to be more like him.

I think it's important that we work on not rejecting people by rejecting new ideas. I think that it's important that we focus on a church that celebrates what God has done while choosing childhood and purposing our hearts and our minds and our vision on what he is yet to do, cos I believe that now is the time for us to step out in faith and step out together to see God the Father bring more people into his family.

I hope you've been blessed by this Action for Children Sunday. I hope you are encouraged and don't feel offended by what I have said this morning. It is born out of a place of such passion; I find it such a blessed thing to be involved with – helping young people to develop in Christian faith. But also it's important that we include young people as much as we can, because I can tell you as a youth leader, I have learnt a load off them – probably as much as they have learnt off me in the last year and a half. And we need to be a church that promotes young people stepping out within it, and getting practice in stepping out in their faith.

I hope you've been blessed, I hope you've been challenged; and I hope that we can see each other very, very soon. Thank you, bless you,
