Nothing Can Separate Us from God's Love

Sermon

When I was a teenager I remember being entranced by a cartoon which was published in the newspaper my parents took. It was entitled *Love Is...* and each installment depicted a cute cartoon girl and boy illustrating one possible way of completing that sentence: Love is bringing her a bunch of flowers, just because; Love is rubbing his feet when they're aching; Love is cooking the meal she likes best, even when you don't.

There are many, many ways of ending that sentence, because there are many, many ways of experiencing love. And I would say the same approach would work if we swap the word Love for Life. Life is beautiful; Life is difficult; Life is not all a bed of roses; Life is what happens while you're making other plans; Life is a sexually transmitted disease which is invariably fatal; Life is a journey, a puzzle, an enigma, a gift.

Human beings have always wrestled with, and argued about, the right way to live. A lot of the angst we feel about it has to do with social expectations – they way we are accustomed to people behaving, and the pressure we put on one another when someone doesn't fit in. But social mores change over time and place. Six months ago, if I had met someone for the first time in a formal setting I would have put out my hand to shake theirs, and I would have been a bit miffed if they declined. In early March, we had three new people turn up to Bread Church at Warwick, each of whom put out their hand to shake mine when I approached them, and I declined – I do hope they weren't offended. Now – I just can't imagine shaking anyone's hand, for a very long time.

One of the ways in which we cope with the complexity of life and relationships is by making rules. We've certainly had a lot of those in the past few months – we've struggled to adapt, to

keep up when they change, and to know what to think when other people seemed to be either ignoring them, or taking them to the nth degree. The trouble with rules is that they cannot cover every single situation or occurrence. Hence they need to be interpreted.

When God offered Solomon, who had just been made King, anything he wanted – offered to grant him one wish, if you like – he asked for wisdom. Wisdom to know how to interpret and apply the law; wisdom to decide between competing priorities, to discern the best way forward for all of the people he was called to rule over. In so doing, he implicitly acknowledged that he would often face situations when he wouldn't know what to do for the best. I'm sure we've all felt like that at times, not least during this pandemic. When the way ahead is unclear or confusing, our readings this week offer us encouragement and hope.

Our Gospel reading ends with Jesus saying that every scribe who has been trained for the Kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old. What is he talking about? Well, scribes were scholars of the law. They had read and studied and pondered how to understand and apply the Hebrew Scriptures, what we tend to call the Old Testament, for years and years. That's the old treasure. But the Kingdom of Heaven – the intimate, personal knowledge of God, the relationship with our creator which Jesus speaks of, is the new treasure. It is like the wisdom which Solomon asked for and received - but it's so much more. It is the ability to read the times; to understand the way that things are changing and moving, and react accordingly.

I don't know about you, but I feel that that would be a wonderful ability to have, and I'm also aware that I have plenty of room to grow in that regard. So, in these rapidly moving and

confusing times, where do we turn? Here are two thoughts for you take away and ponder for yourself.

The first comes from the parables in our Gospel readings. The mustard seed and the yeast show us the potentially enormous power of small things. The habit of reflection or prayer – taking even a minute or two to pause at regular intervals, to allow our mind to still, can be incredibly powerful. In those few moments, we may find an insight which unlocks the problem we've been wrestling with; we may find new feelings of compassion towards the person who's been annoying us, enabling us to engage with them in a more graceful way. Small things make a big difference – a word of welcome or encouragement, a smile to the stranger we pass on our walk, a phone call or a text or a card to tell someone we are thinking of them, can have far-reaching effects. Each act on its own may seem insignificant; but if we make them our daily habit, they can add up to a great deal.

The second comes from our reading from Romans. Do you sometimes feel that you don't know what to pray for – or how to pray? Do you ever wonder if God is listening, if there is any point in praying at all? You are not alone in that. But the promise of Romans is that God's Holy Spirit helps us when we don't know how to pray. God is praying for us and in us, even if our own words and actions feel inadequate. In truth, our words and actions will always be imperfect. But they are still precious to God, because we are precious to God. Our trying, our desiring to please God, pleases God. We try and we fail, or we fail to try – but that won't stop God loving us. Nothing will stop God loving us. Nothing can cut us off from God's love, even when it doesn't feel that way.

Remember the power of small things. A word of prayer here, a kind action there, a moment's stillness to invite the Spirit to speak. These are

the small things of our daily lives which add up to one big thing – building the Kingdom of Heaven, here and now. Remember the love of God, which is always with us, whether we are aware of it or not. God's love is amazing, unconditional, allembracing, never ending. God's love is yours, and it's mine, for ever.
