The Commissioning of the Disciples

¹⁶Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them.
¹⁷When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted. ¹⁸And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. ¹⁹Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Sermon

September is a month of new beginnings: children starting or restarting schools; universities will, in some way, recommence teaching; and in the Methodist church it is the beginning of our new connexional year – Things start again. And so it is a time of firsts – my first meetings here; my first services here. And over the last few days, I've been reflecting back on firsts.

I remember my first days at high school, we had a Vice Principal – Mr Edwards. He was an interesting chap, who was about 6 ft tall, built as a rugby playing forward and had a very thick, Welsh accent. He was somebody to be feared but the first time you met him would be in your first few days at school as he ran the dinner queue. As you queued up to enter the dining hall, he would come down the queue, reminding himself of the names of boys who'd been at the school for some time and learning the names of those of us as first years. And so in a school much bigger than the primary school I'd attended, I stood in that dinner queue thinking how wonderful it was that somebody as important as the Vice Principal was wanting to know my name. Of course there was another motive - later when I was misbehaving or running or doing something I shouldn't – what was shouted wasn't 'Oi! You!' but my name. The authority he had came from knowing us and from being able to stop us dead in our tracks. It was an authority that began with care but made sure that we acted in a way that didn't put ourselves or others at risk.

And so I reflect on the closing words of Matthews Gospel – Jesus opens this short discourse with the words 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me'. And I wonder if we realise just what that means? Jesus doesn't have *some* authority – many of us through our work, our lives, through church, through family and parenthood, or grandparenthood, have authority, we have some form of power over other people or over our own lives. Yet Jesus is not claiming to have some authority – he is saying he has been given all authority. There is no body with more authority than him – in heaven or on the earth. And I wonder when we read the gospels, and we hear Jesus's words, and through the Spirit when we experience the presence of Christ in our own lives, whether we are acknowledging that he has all, all authority.

Because if we did acknowledge that Jesus had all authority, then his words, his commandment, his actions have huge implications for how we do things, for how we live our lives, for how we interact with each other and with God. It won't become something we could listen to for a short while on a Sunday or watching worship online but impacts every moment of our being.

And so I invite you to press pause and to take some time to consider in *your* life, in the way *you* are, in the things that you do – are you declaring that Jesus has all authority over you? or are you proclaiming to have authority over Jesus? - are you claiming to know better, to know more and to have more power than God the Father who gave the authority to Jesus? Take some time and reflect on that question.

Jesus having declared he has all authority gives a number of commandments to the disciples, and that begins with 'Go'. 'Go therefore and make disciples of all nations'. It is not a request, often as children, I remember being told to remember to say please, and I hear myself saying it now or thinking it if I hear someone ask for something and they don't say please – I have to sometimes hold myself back and not say 'what's the word?'. But Jesus deliberately doesn't say 'Please'. He deliberately doesn't say 'if you would like to'. This is a command. This is written to be something that Jesus is telling us to do. Go therefore means, because he has all authority, he is telling us to go and make disciples. What a commission! What a role and responsibility we have as disciples of Christ, to not only disciple ourselves but to take the Good News to all around us - sometimes in the words that we speak, sometimes in the way that we live and sometimes in our actions towards others. But the call is there – to take this good news, that God loves all people - and to make that good news real for people.

But Jesus isn't telling us to go and make believers, even the devil believes. He is wanting us to go and make disciples, people who follow him, people who recognise his authority, read his word and then do their best to live by it. But for that relationship with Jesus to be more than simply reading the words of scripture, for it to be a real, and alive, and life-giving relationship with Christ.

There've been many occasions I've had conversations where people have found difficulty and they've said, 'I've not known how people could live through this and not have faith, because it is my faith that is keeping me going.' I wonder what life would be like for me without faith – this faith, - knowing that I am loved and responding to that love - has had such an impact. If that has had an impact for you, then surely there is a need to tell others there is more to life. There is a God who loves us and wants a relationship with us. Who wants us to live and be the very best people we can be as disciples of Christ.

When I hear those words – 'go and make disciples' - there's a bit of me going 'Oh but, send them, send somebody else, somebody else can do this'. The story of the calling of Moses, here I am lord, send my brother. And it's easy for us to think that the making of disciples is somebody else's job. I'm convinced that it is the role of every Christian, to be part of that Good News story. That isn't that we all need to stand on street corners or with big boards on us. But it is how we live, and it is being ready to explain our faith. 'So why do you do this? Why do you worship? - Many times – Why do you go to church on a Sunday? We might think that we can't make disciples. There isn't anything that Jesus asks his disciples to do that he knows they can't do. Jesus doesn't set us up to fail, instead Jesus sets us up to tell stories of Good News. A few months ago, having led a course entitled 'Talking of Jesus', an elderly man from one of my churches rang the manse, he was excited, - he'd got home from doing some shopping, he was excited, because on his way home, somebody had stopped him and asked him about

something, and he had managed to get in to that conversation, 'God loves you'. And he'd never done it before, but the impact it had on him, that he was able to do something, was huge

Jesus goes on reminding us that disciples are baptised into the family of God. But he then commands that we should teach them to obey everything that Jesus has commanded. When we hear the stories of Jesus, he tells us and reminds us that the greatest commandments are love: that we love God, that we love one another as God has loved us. This, in so many ways, is the mission of the Church – it is about *showing* love in every possible way. As Methodists we might say that is our call to social holiness or social justice. It is challenging the injustices of this world. It is not simply giving food to a food bank; but challenging why are people poor in the first place? What is unequal about our society? It's going beyond normal and if God loves you this much, why is this happening? Its what we might call mission, but mission and evangelism go together. We are called to be disciples to go and take good news – sometimes that taking of good news is a meal, is clothing, is dignity, is giving of our time to somebody who feels they are worthless, it is praying for somebody when there is nothing else we can do but pray.

Everything that Jesus has commanded, is that we *love*, and that isn't one day a week, or part of the time, or when it suits us, or when the other person is lovable, but it's all the time. Now Jesus knows we are not perfect, just as Mr Edwards had to shout my name once or twice down the corridor, we are not perfect. And perhaps that is one of the greatest aspects of the Church. We are not perfect. And so when we call out to others we're not saying come and be perfect, what we're saying is come and be part of the family of God where we strive to be better than we are, and our imperfections, the things we get wrong, have already been covered by grace.

Jesus reminds them he is with them always. He is with us always – to the end of the age. This is the calling of the Church to recognise that Jesus has all authority in heaven and on earth; to go and make disciples of all nations, of all people everywhere. To teach them everything Jesus has commanded, to love one another as he has loved us. That is our calling as Church. That is who we are meant to be. Make time to consider how you, how you as an individual, how you as a part of Church, might respond to the calling of God
