¹In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, ²asking, 'Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage.' ³When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; ⁴and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. ⁵They told him, 'In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

6"And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;

for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Reflection

Our Carol service began with those words from Isaiah:

'the people who walked in darkness have seen a great light

those who lived in a land of deep darkness, on them, light has shined'.

And many times this year we may have felt as though we've been in a land of darkness: the darkness of Covid and lockdown; of not being able to go out and see people; of being afraid even to go shopping, maybe worried about our jobs or the jobs of our families; unable to meet even to worship together.

Yet the prophet Isaiah isn't simply talking about a time that is hard and difficult, but pointing to the hope of a new future.

'On those who walked in darkness, a light has shined.'

In the last year, there has not been a single moment where God has not been with us; where God's light has not shined amongst us. In the deepest, darkest of times, God has been present with us, holding us, caring for us, loving us. We have seen that love and care in so many ways: through services going online; letters sent to those unable to be amongst us. New ways of being; new ways of talking about God, and yet the same God. Perhaps, this is summed up best in the words that in the darkness we have had grounds for hope. Hope in a new future – not simply a return to the pre-Covid past, but a new future with new ways of hearing the message of God and worshipping him.

Hopefully Covid has changed us for the better. Maybe in the dark times this year, you have hoped for a vaccine or a treatment. Maybe, like me, you have spent time googling Oxford vaccine, Pfizer vaccine — anything to find good news. For Isaiah and for us the people of God, that good news is not in a syringe with a needle; but with the gift of a baby boy, born that first Christmas. That gift of God becoming one of us, calling us into a new future a new hope, a new way of being.

In a few moments we will hear the reading from John's gospel where we hear that this child who is human and divine creates a situation where we are known as the Children of God. Not because we were born into it, or because we have wanted it but because God has determined we are his children.

We have a new hope for the future, that isn't simply a new vaccine, but that God has been

present with us throughout this year and will be present with us into the new future. We will be changed forever, but the world has already been changed forever that first Christmas, for this child will be born unable to feed himself, unable to care for himself, unable even to change his own nappy; dependent on us. This child will be born not to simply help us but to show us the very love of God present even in the deepest, darkest of times. This child will grow, grow in to the man who will hang on a cross to die for us. Offering us not simply hope, not simply life, but life eternal.

Over the past few weeks, we have heard of a light of a vaccine and a way out of lockdown and tears, a way back to being together and with our families. Yet when we are back together, when this Covid is no more, the world will still need to hear the Christmas story, one not of life given that we may live and die, but life given that we may live life to all its fullest and when we die, we die in to the deeper presence of God that is eternal life.

As you reach under your Christmas tree, finding presents to unwrap, I hope you find a new present, - a present that is the good news; the news that Christ, the one and only son of God, is amongst us, born to raise us from being the children of the earth into being the children of God. Born to bring life eternal, born to bring hope even in the darkest of times.

May you be richly blessed this Christmas time.
