# Ezekiel's Call to Be a Prophet

Epistle 2 Corinthians 12:2-10 (NRSVA)

<sup>2</sup>I know a person in Christ who fourteen years ago was caught up to the third heaven—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know; God knows. <sup>3</sup> And I know that such a person—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know; God knows— <sup>4</sup> was caught up into Paradise and heard things that are not to be told, that no mortal is permitted to repeat. <sup>5</sup> On behalf of such a one I will boast, but on my own behalf I will not boast, except of my weaknesses. <sup>6</sup> But if I wish to boast, I will not be a fool, for I will be speaking the truth. But I refrain from it, so that no one may think better of me than what is seen in me or heard from me, <sup>7</sup> even considering the

exceptional character of the revelations. Therefore, to keep<sup>[a]</sup> me from being too elated, a thorn was given to me in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to torment me, to keep me from being too elated. <sup>[b]</sup> <sup>8</sup> Three times I appealed to the Lord about this, that it would leave me, <sup>9</sup> but he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for power<sup>[c]</sup> is made perfect in weakness.' So, I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may dwell in me. <sup>10</sup> Therefore I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities for the sake of Christ; for whenever I am weak, then I am strong.

# The Rejection of Jesus at Nazareth

**6** He left that place and came to his home town, and his disciples followed him. <sup>2</sup>On the sabbath he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astounded. They said, 'Where did this man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been given to him? What deeds of power are being done by his hands! 3 Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary[a] and brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?' And they took offence[b] at him. <sup>4</sup>Then Jesus said to them, 'Prophets are not without honour, except in their home town, and among their own kin, and in their own house.' 5 And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and cured them. <sup>6</sup> And he was amazed at their unbelief.

# The Mission of the Twelve

Then he went about among the villages teaching.

<sup>7</sup> He called the twelve and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits.

<sup>8</sup> He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts;

<sup>9</sup> but to

wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. <sup>10</sup> He said to them, 'Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. <sup>11</sup> If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them.' <sup>12</sup> So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. <sup>13</sup> They cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.

Sermon

# Visions and thorns

These two words seemed to stand out from our readings and form a link between them.

In today's Gospel we find Jesus back in Nazareth where he'd grown up. In the time he'd been away from Nazareth – probably over a year by this time, his ministry had been extraordinary! He been cleansing people who'd been possessed by the most awful evil spirits; healed all sorts of illnesses – even raised a young girl from the dead. By the time we reach Ch 6 he'd attracted a large group of followers from whom he'd selected 12 to be his trusted companions. Then with his new and trusted friends he left the area around Galilee to return for a visit to Nazareth. So the great majority who met him there, certainly saw a man they recognised but when he stood up in the synagogue and addressed them they witnessed something very different a wisdom and authority they were not expecting.

The person they saw in front of them was Jesus – the ordinary carpenter who'd grown up amongst them. And here he was, taking on the role of a learned professor in front of them all?

Words such as scandalised, indignant, deeply shocked, affronted, spring to mind to describe the reaction of Jesus' former neighbours to his preaching. They would not, could not accept that this person who'd grown up as one of them could now be someone so different – so much above them.

For him it was like talking to a brick wall! The words, the meaning just wasn't going in. No wonder he wasn't doing any great miracles there. He was only able to help a few who came to him with relatively minor illnesses. (Or perhaps had not known him in the past). His neighbours, even his own family were a hard bunch to deal with. He was astonished but also dismayed. His wonder was as great as his pain. He was already a controversial figure.

And his reaction on the wider scale? He loved them all so much he simply kept on trying until with his death, Resurrection and Ascension, he succeeded once and for all in completing that link, that spiritual link between God his Father, the creator, and his creation on earth. Jesus had that vision – he was that vision in the making – but there would be thorns on the way, symbolised by a crown of thorns.

But then Jesus sent out the disciples to just what he'd been doing - with only mixed success! -But he sent them out in pairs and gave them detailed instructions and his Spirit so that they had every chance of success. They were to go just as they were – no back-up supplies of any kind, no money in their purses – purely in his strength. I believe all those details about no material back-up for the journey are figurative speech for their going in his strength alone none of their own human self-confidence. They were to be no more than channels of the power & love they'd recently experienced and received from him. They'd seen enough during their time with Jesus to know that it wasn't all plain sailing. They'd seen him tired, worn out, misunderstood and rejected – but they'd also seen his awesome

power and self-giving. They went out perhaps in apprehension (as I do often!) but in his strength and they succeeded. They were his team. And they came back successful.

But what about Ezekiel? We read of his call and of God's warning of the difficulties he would face.

In 597BC King Jehoiachin of Judah had surrendered Jerusalem to the Babylonian army and was taken into exile together with the 'good and great' of the nation of Judah including Ezekiel. Those were difficult times. Some of the exiles longed for their homeland; "By the rivers of Babylon..." Ps 137 .....but others had taken advantage of the relative affluence Babylon offered and they opposed Ezekiel's call, making themselves very much at home in Babylon, embracing the local culture and religions. They were like scorpions, thorns and briers around him. But Ezekiel never gave up and eventually after several visions and directions from God, Ezekiel's final vision was that of the return of the exiles and rebuilding of the temple in Jerusalem. And so it came to be. In 539BC the Persians under King Cyrus overcame the Babylonians and facilitated the return of the Israelites to their homeland and the rebuilding of the temple at Jerusalem. For Ezekiel there were visions and thorns

In the epistle we heard St Paul was writing to the Corinthians about 20 or so years after the death and Resurrection of Jesus. As he wrote that 2<sup>nd</sup> letter to the Corinthians he had already completed 2 missionary journeys and visited almost all the communities for which we have his letters in the NT. And he'd experienced horrendous trials and tribulations physical and emotional in the process. He too had received a vision- on the road to Damascus, and also the one we heard about today, of a life to come, but

in the meantime he was suffering the pains of that persistent thorn – similar to the figurative language that God had used in his call to Ezekiel. Paul's missionary work was far from easy or comfortable. But it had its rewards: Visions and thorns.

So there we have it. Just part of the timeline of God's relationship with his people. 600BC to 56 AD. And it's not difficult to see the similarities with today – perhaps not very evident here, but elsewhere on a scale and of a degree surely similar. Here & now we see little of the actual aggression and antagonism which we know exists elsewhere but we do meet brick walls sometimes. However, we must remember that right at the centre of it all, then and now, lies the death of Jesus, his Resurrection Ascension and return in the living Spirit of the person who, in our Gospel reading had such trouble with his home crowd. But they didn't know what we know now.

Remember the disciples were told to go with nothing of normal human 'kit' or 'gear' for a journey as we might call it. They were to go only 'in the strength of the Lord- even if and when there were thorns, their vision was to be his spirit. That made me feel apprehensive as I began to think of a hymn to end this section of our worship.

"I'll go in the strength of the Lord in paths he has marked for my feet/ to work he appoints me to do/ to conflicts which faith will require...." Very good tune (Not in StF nor A&M 2013). Awake our souls away our fears, let every trembling thought be gone;

Awake and run the heavenly race and put a cheerful courage on...... 'thorny road...'
