New Testament Reading

Acts 10:34-43 (NRSV)

Gentiles Hear the Good News

Then Peter began to speak to them: 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does

what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

Gospel

John 20:1-23 (NRSV)

The Resurrection of Jesus

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.' Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did

not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

Jesus Appears to Mary Magdalene

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' When she had said this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." 'Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Jesus Appears to the Disciples

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.'

An Easter Affirmation

This is the Good News – The grave is empty, Christ is risen. HALLELUJAH!

Christ is our peace, the indestructible peace we now share with each other.

Greetings to you all in the Name of our Risen Jesus. Wherever and whenever you are reading this service, I pray God's richest blessings be with you.

The affirmation above reminds us of the peace and strength that the joy of Easter Day brings. Christ is Risen! If there is one thing that I'm sure we all crave at the moment, it is the 'indestructible peace' that we read of above. I wonder what 'indestructible peace' means for you? Is it physical security, or mental wellbeing, or an absence of war, or something else entirely? Is it something that humans can provide for each other? Or is it something only God, through Jesus, can give us?

Peace has seemed elusive of late, hasn't it? No sooner did we appear to be coming to terms with the fact that Covid is here to stay, and making plans to live with that anxious reality, than a fresh

horror opened up before us, in the invasion of Ukraine. So, peace may have felt elusive for us lately, in these circumstances, and perhaps not just elusive but actually unattainable, unreachable. Perhaps you feel we have taken peace for granted in our own country — I know I certainly do. It was a shock to realise that peace for the United Kingdom is actually just as fragile as it is for many other countries of the world.

Stephen Cottrell, the Archbishop of York, has reminded us of the need to be not just peace-lovers but also peace-makers. On BBC Radio 2's Pause for Thought, right at the beginning of the conflict, he said:

How should we respond? Well, here's three things all of us can do:

- 1. Be prepared to make sacrifices ourselves. Sanctions on Russia will also affect us. We have to be ready to pay that price.
- 2. Offer generous humanitarian aid. Just think for a moment what it's like to be a young family living in the middle of Kyiv at the moment, sheltering from bombs in metro stations, fearing for the future. We must offer help.
- 3. Be ready to welcome Ukrainian refugees into our country. And, make it easier for them to come.

And, for me, there's a fourth. As a follower of Jesus Christ, I will be praying.

Yes, for an end to the madness of war and a withdrawal of Russian forces; but also because we people of faith believe prayer changes things, beginning with ourselves.

In the Lord's Prayer, Jesus says, 'Your kingdom come', Lord, not the kingdoms of the world. 'Your will be done', not the will of despots and tyrants. Prayer helps us to see things differently; changes our perspective; helps us love our neighbour - our neighbours in Ukraine and Russia; strengthens our resolve.

Because Jesus doesn't just ask us to be peace lovers — that's relatively easy. He says, "Blessed are the peacemakers."

By doing these three things — maybe all four - we can begin to support Ukraine.

We can begin to make peace.

If the last two years, and these last two months, have shown us anything, perhaps it is that peace is not a passive state. It is more than an absence of trouble. It is a beautiful acknowledgement of the presence of God, and it has to be sought, and cherished. It just doesn't happen by itself. The Psalmists understood this. Psalm 34:14 reads 'Depart from evil, and do good; seek peace, and pursue it'.

When Mary arrived at the garden early in the morning, she would have felt far from peaceful. Her beloved Lord had been crucified; she was distraught, confused, grieving, desperate. Her fresh horror that morning was the discovery that someone had moved her Lord's body, and she did not know where they had taken him. For Mary, at that moment, it was the final act of desecration. It was now not possible for her Lord to be violated any more. So she stands outside the tomb, and weeps.

But with a single word - her own name everything, everything changes. In verse 16 of John 20 we read 'Jesus said to her, "Mary!". There is so much contained in that one single word! Jesus' knowledge of her, her past, her future, her faith, her love for Jesus - all of this summed up in one word as the Risen Jesus speaks her name. Who can possibly imagine the rush of emotions that must have overwhelmed her at this point? Joy, fear, disbelief, and ecstasy must have all played their part. But when some time had elapsed, when she had had time to process even some tiny part of the tumultuous events that had just taken place, Mary must have been overwhelmed with a tremendous sense of astonishment, and relief, and peace. Perhaps she experienced then what later writers were to call 'the peace of God, which passeth all understanding' (Philippians 4:7).

Oh, if we could really grasp even the faintest sense of that 'indestructible peace'! What a profound effect it would have on our lives, on the lives of those around us, on our churches, on our Circuit, on Methodism as a whole. Mary's life was never the same again after Jesus spoke her name. Neither were the lives of the disciples, who were changed from a frightened little group hiding in a locked room to a convinced, courageous company of the faithful, after Jesus appeared and spoke the astonishing words 'Peace be with you'. How do we live out this indestructible peace in our own lives? How will we share this peace with those we know so desperately need it?

I pray that in this Easter season we will all be able to experience Christ's indestructible peace more deeply and more profoundly. **Amen.**
