THE PREPARATION

God's Covenant with David

<sup>1</sup>Now when the king was settled in his house, and the Lord had given him rest from all his enemies around him, <sup>2</sup>the king said to the prophet Nathan, 'See now, I am living in a house of cedar, but the ark of God stays in a tent.'

<sup>3</sup>Nathan said to the king, 'Go, do all that you have in mind; for the Lord is with you.'

One in Christ

Gospel Mark 6:30-34,53-56 (NRSVA)

Feeding the Five Thousand

<sup>30</sup>The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. <sup>31</sup>He said to them, 'Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.' For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. <sup>32</sup>And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. <sup>33</sup>Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. <sup>34</sup>As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.

Healing the Sick in Gennesaret

## Sermon

Some conversations you will never forget. I sat beside my Dad's hospital bed having a catch up having not seen him for over four months. The timing was not our choice to say the least. It was the first year in ministry and I was in Harare one week into an intensive (five week) language school to learn the Shona language having been in circuit in Gweru just over three months when the phone call came. It was the Methodist Church Overseas Division Pastoral Secretary who told me that my father was critically ill, undergoing emergency aortic surgery and the family want you to return. Book the next economy flight and we will pay the fare. I left my wife and three young children behind and was 'home' within 48 hours. Over the next two weeks I visited most days spending time with him and the immediate family and liaising with him to keep his business running. He had six men working on three different sites and I was the only immediate family member who knew the Fencing Trade well enough to stand in.

He was interested to hear about my experience of ministry and my early impressions of Zimbabwe. Among many things I remember telling him that the Shona people had an inbuilt respect culture which had an hierarchy from top to bottom as follows: Senior men, senior women, married men, married men with children, married women, married women with children, unmarried adult men, unmarried adult women, children. It was assumed that older men in particular possess greater wisdom and therefore had greater authority. At that point in time I was just over 31 while Dad was 63 – twice my age therefore twice my wisdom. His reply surprised me. "I don't think that's true" he said "I'm just as capable of making mistakes and getting it wrong now as I was when I was your age" To which I

replied "as capable perhaps but less likely to as you have more experience than me. We discussed this for some while and I offer it to you for thought.

There has always been debate around the difference between knowledge and wisdom. The classic example of 'knowledge tell you a tomato is a fruit, wisdom advises against putting it in a fruit salad'. No doubt you can think of many and better examples. But I do believe that you cannot have much wisdom without knowledge whole I agree that possession of knowledge does not guarantee wisdom. Armed with both knowledge and wisdom born of experience and an open mind combined with a concern for what is best for oneself and others we are best equipped for decision making. But we can still get it wrong. King David is not credited in the Bible as having great wisdom, that description was given to his son, Solomon. But throughout his life he did make some excellent decisions and he listened to his advisors especially Nathan the prophet.

The shepherd boy David was the unlikely choice to face and defeat Goliath, his faith and cunning destined him for leadership and ultimately the throne which he achieved without sacrificing loyalty to King Saul or compromising his friendship with Prince Jonathan. He shepherded Israel to become a prosperous and united nation with respect for God and His guiding principles. Throughout his life David sought to live according to those principles himself though he would be the first to admit he often failed and sometimes got things very wrong. His affair with Bathsheba and the conspiracy to do away with her husband were his worst errors of judgment, of human weakness, but his achievements were outstanding. My son is a Defence Strategist and Advisor working for the M.O.D. He spent some

time discussing with me from an academic point of view David's military strategies who he saw as many generations ahead of others in the ancient world. Moving his headquarters from Beersheba to Salem, renamed Jerusalem being one of them. (The fortress city was home of a Canaanite Deity "Shalem" so claiming it and renaming it sent a powerful message of defeat and humiliation to the Canaanites. Salem has linguistic echoes of shalom which translates as peace, while the prefix Je is a respect name for God hence city of God's peace worth defending with your life...)

Yet it is Solomon who is singled out as the wise King in the Scriptures. The wise way he handled and settled a conflict between two young women each claiming the baby born alive was theirs became legendary. 1 Kings 4: 29 – 34 puts it like this:

<sup>29</sup>God gave Solomon wisdom and very great insight, and a breadth of understanding as measureless as the sand on the seashore. <sup>30</sup>Solomon's wisdom was greater than the wisdom of all the people of the East, and greater than all the wisdom of Egypt. <sup>31</sup>He was wiser than anyone else, including Ethan the Ezrahite—wiser than Heman, Kalkol and Darda, the sons of Mahol. And his fame spread to all the surrounding nations. <sup>32</sup>He spoke three thousand proverbs and his songs numbered a thousand and five. <sup>3</sup> He spoke about plant life, from the cedar of Lebanon to the hyssop that grows out of walls. He also spoke about animals and birds, reptiles and fish. <sup>34</sup>From all nations people came to listen to Solomon's wisdom, sent by all the kings of the world, who had heard of his wisdom.

I note this translation has altered some words. Originally it was "wisdom greater than all men" and in verse 34 "any man". When I first read it I thought that the exclusion of women was deliberate because there were and are plenty of women who are wiser! Some folk noted that the nations who best handled the COVID virus were led by women – Germany, New Zealand etc...

Anyhow, in spite of this description with the inclusive language I don't think Solomon always 'got it right' In our passage this morning from 2 Samuel the Lord gives clear guidance to King David not to build a temple. More important than fine stones and gold trimmings would be his reputation for justice and all the nation living the way God instructed and guides. In these verses The Lord, through Nathan, points ahead to the Kingdom that will be established by one who is David's descendent. We believe that to be Jesus and we seek his Kingdom first in our generation. Solomon, renowned for his wisdom is the king who sets about building a temple changing the theology from a broad belief that God is to be found wherever we are to One who has a place of special reverence. As we look back over the centuries of conflict around Jerusalem currently Muslims and Jews who each want exclusive tenancy of the temple site I can't help but wonder if Solomon made a mistake. But then I've made the odd mistake myself over the years....

I have focussed our thoughts this morning on the difficulty of making wise decisions for ourselves as individuals and for the wider community which will be very pertinent from tomorrow- 19<sup>th</sup> July. (At the time of writing our government's intention is to set society pretty much free of COVID restrictions). We have lived through the biggest trauma in several generations, the social, economic, religious, and health – physical and mental- costs are yet to be fully realised. National governments and international organisations have done their best to guide us

through sometimes getting it right, sometimes doing the right thing but too late, and sometimes just getting the balance wrong. We are all deeply grateful for the international team of scientists particularly those at Oxford who devised and got vaccines approved so quickly. Grateful too for the herculean effort of so many staff and volunteers who have delivered the injections. (I hate the word "jabs"!)

But now it's down to us. Our government believes the time is right to replace law with advice, trusting the public to do what is best. We are going to need wisdom in making sound decisions. My worry is whether we have enough knowledge to make good decisions. I also worry that human selfishness – sin in Biblical language will skew judgements and set us back a bit. That said, this had to come at some point – tomorrow or in another few weeks- and we are going to have face it. The cynic in me thinks the government is passing the responsibility to us so that if we have a third wave it will be our fault, not theirs! Hopefully that's not the case. When to put on a face covering? Who and where to mix with others? Should I stay at home or go out at all? Should I come back to public worship? These will be difficulty personal decisions balancing protection and well being of self with that of others. And we must avoid the trap of becoming judgemental of other people's decisions.

Oh lord, give us all greater wisdom and greater insight than that of Solomon so that we can do well in these next weeks and months.
