Jeremiah's Complaint

⁷You deceived me, Lord, and I was deceived; you overpowered me and prevailed. I am ridiculed all day long; everyone mocks me. ⁸Whenever I speak, I cry out proclaiming violence and destruction. So the word of the Lord has brought me insult and reproach all day long. ⁹But if I say, "I will not mention his word or speak anymore in his name," his word is in my heart like a fire, a fire shut up in my bones. Dead to Sin, Alive in Christ

¹What shall we say, then? Shall we go on sinning so that grace may increase? ²By no means! We are those who have died to sin; how can we live in it any longer? ³Or don't you know that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? ⁴We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life.

Sermon

Believe the hype...

Do you believe something because it's real and true... or sometimes do you get dragged into believing the hype and the latest fad? #EatClean Was one of those popular diet movements that has been trendy for quite some time. Promoting eating only whole grain foods, fruits, vegetables, unrefined and unprocessed food. My Instagram and Social media accounts were full of the Hash tag #EatClean. My social media was full of these perfect meals, beautifully presented and an inspirational story underneath. I've always wondered if some of those bloggers would ever go out for a sneaky McDonalds, or if their whole life was dedicated to eating clean.

In 2017 we saw the #MeToo movement of solidarity and empathy. Breaking the silence on women who have survived sexual abuse. Following the exposure on the widespread sexual abuse allegations against Harvey Weinstein, the movement began to spread virally on Social media. I was one of the millions of people who used the hashtag as we revealed the extent of the problem of sexual harassment.

'In a world where you can be anything #BeKind'. Words written by the TV presenter Caroline Flack on Instagram in December 2019 before she chose to take her own life. Tens of thousands have used the hashtag #BeKind in a clamour for change, pressing both the media and individuals to think more carefully about the impact of their words online. And so I changed my profile picture on Facebook to include the tagline 'Be Kind'.

This year I have made rainbows with my children, Clapped for Key workers on a Thursday at 8pm. Made a children's online video joining in the 'BLACK LIVES MATTER' movement, joined in Black Out Tuesday and said 'its ok to not be ok'.

Apart from the #EatClean fad, I do believe in all of these causes and would like to see their trend increase so that they have a longer lasting impact and change made to society than the latest Fads, which are short-lived and rooted in novelty and popular culture. Each of these campaigns highlight and bring voice to an issue that needs to be heard.

Why are we joining in? Is it earnest, authentic and sincere? Do we believe the Hype?

So I want to turn to look at the passage from Matthews Gospel

He's got crowds flocking around Him, all very excited by what he's doing: the astonishing healings, his remarkable teaching which stands up and challenges even the leaders and the Pharisees, those with power and influence in the society of that time. This man who welcomes the sinner and the unclean. This man who was anointed and clearly a prophet. Has Jesus become the Hype?

Neither the gathered crown nor the 12 have any idea where he's headed. That his calling, purpose, anointing would ultimately lead him to Jerusalem and the cross. And I question the longevity of the crowd.

And so here Jesus is again, with a large crowd not only around him, but my bible says traveling with him; following to make sure they hear all of his teaching. Have you heard... everyone is talking about...

And here's when Jesus teaches again- This time he cuts through the hype and is really honest about the cost of following in his footsteps.

Cutting through the hype and of course on the way bringing the equal blessing and challenge of the gospel of self-sacrifice and grace. You are loved and known. You have worth. Even the hairs on your head are counted.

Take up your cross and follow me.

I mean Jesus talks in a lot of parables doesn't he... so on hearing that they would have to pick up their cross and follow him... he's speaking metaphorically, surely? Jesus is saying when the hype goes... when the next big fad or even trend is here... who will stand up and be counted? When the crowds turn against me, and vote to crucify me, will you even say that you knew me?...

So let's start addressing what the passage actually says...

Anyone else struggling to read this passage with the hating of father, mother, wife and children in this week's passage??

Like – it's Father's Day, this passage is a little severe and even cruel to have on a day like today. HAPPY FATHERS DAY by the way dad. So, this passage sounds harsh to our 21st century ears right!

Family is the single most important influence in a child's life. From their first moments of life, babies and children depend on parents to protect them and provide for all their needs. Parents and family form a child's first relationships. I read a book recently called 'Why Love matters' lent to me by a phycologist. The affection that we receive from an early age even from babies shapes our brains and the way that we will form relationships in the future. Loving relationships are crucial to our capacity to be human.

It's how we were created. We were created for relationship with God and with one another. And it's one of the reasons why many of us are finding lockdown so hard.

I truly believe the importance of families. Family and those whom we choose to be family and how we do community are central to the Gospel and our heavenly Father's plan for us. Throughout the rest of the gospels, the new testament, the old testament, even the 10 commandments express the importance of family life. The responsibility to love and care for one another and our children. With so much turmoil out in the world, surely our homes that we build are meant to reflect a place of refuge

from the storm

You can't talk to me for more than a few minutes without me telling you a story about one of my small humans.

So, is this passage from Matthews gospel a conflict for me? Does in contradict the rest of the bible...

The theologian Tom Wright explains the passage in this way:

'Imagine if you will a politician standing on a soap-box addressing a crowd.

'If you are going to vote for me, he says, you're voting to lose your homes and families; you're asking for higher taxes and lower wages; you're deciding in favour of losing all you love best! So come on then, who's on my side?'

The crowd wouldn't even bother heckling him, or throwing rotten tomatoes at him. They would just be puzzled. Why on earth would anyone try to advertise themselves in that way?

But this is pretty much what Jesus is doing in this passage.

'Want to be my disciple, do you? Well, in that case you have to learn to hate your family, give up your possessions and get ready for a nasty death'...

hardly the way to make friends and influence people.

But wait a minute. Supposing, instead of a politician, we think of a great leader of a great expedition, forging a way through high and dangerous mountain pass to bring urgent medical aid to villagers cut off from the rest of the world...

If you want to come any further, the leader says 'you'll have to leave your packs behind. From here on the path is too steep to carry all that stuff. You probably won't find it again. And you'd better send your last post cards home; this is a dangerous route and it's likely that several of us won't make it back.'

We can understand. We may not like it, but we can see why it would make sense.

And so Jesus, in what he's saying is more like the second person than the first. He's more like the Leader of the great expedition that the politician. The way to Easter goes through Good Friday. The way to the resurrection goes through the crucifixion. To have new life there is always death. To be reborn you must die to your old self.'

Christianity has quite rightly been associated with what we call family values... so it comes as a shock to hate your parents, wife, children and siblings. And then even the challenge goes one step more, to hate yourself and be prepared for a shameful death- to take up your cross- which wasn't simply a figure of speech in Jesus world.... Well, then we start to see what's going on. Jesus is not denying the importance of family and living in harmony with them. But that there is an urgent task to be done and everything else, including one's own life, must be put at risk for the sake of the kingdom.

A few of the commentaries I read suggested that instead of 'hate' a better translation is to 'love less'-

Are you willing to love less your mother, father, children, husband, wife, brother, sister, Are you willing to love yourself less - in that you love Christ more and thus embrace a fuller more deeper love?

Are you willing to give up on your 'idea' of church so that Christ may be known?

Jewish Hyperbole- apparently a rabbinic way of over emphasising in order to get the point across about just how much we should love God and put him first.

It's in fact, the same word that Jesus used when he talked about serving two masters, must love one and hate the other...

Therefore it's about priorities and knowing our utter dependence on the toehold of God... But it's still a tough passage.

'What is demanded of disciples... is that in the network of many loyalties in which all of us live,

the claim of Christ and the gospel not only takes precedence but, in fact, redefines the others. This can and will necessarily involve some detaching, and some turning away.' Its more to do with detachment and attachmentour strongest attachment is to the call of Christ

Bonhoeffer talks about cheap grace and costly grace- in discipleship.... 'Being a Christian is about following Christ first and foremost, no matter what that may bring, what it calls us to let go of'

How far would we be willing to follow Christ? To the cross?

To stand up for social justice... and not just what is trendy to stand up for

To stand up for God when others condemn To love those we don't think it's possible to love? For the cost of discipleship is love And often love is to sacrifice one's self for those that we love. Self-giving. Pure Agape Love.

Our call first is to Love God, with all your heart, mind, body, strength and soul. To have no other God before me... to have no other, before God. To love God first is to sacrifice all others.

A bit like a marriage, Jesus calls us to not enter into this lightly or selfishly, for it involves the giving of oneself wholeheartedly. Christ in his self-giving comes to our help, for he loves us and gave himself for us.

There's a precedent and an order.

To love God, to follow Christ, and then to love others and love ourselves.

May we be willing to lose our life and the culture norms imposed on us, so that we stand up and speak out about the issues of justice and injustice that God has given us. May we know the deepness of the love of God. May we know our worth and value as Children of God that even the hairs on your head are counted. But may we not take lightly the call and obedience of being a disciple of Jesus. StF 628 – Faithful One Faithful One, so unchanging, Ageless One, you're my rock of peace.
