# Sermon

Facing Daily Difficulties with Jesus.

Firstly thanks – to all who contribute to make this service become a reality. You are not taken for granted and it would soon get noticed if what you do did NOT happen. A preacher has various roles such as to challenge, to encourage and to comfort. Hopefully all of these elements will appear this morning.

As we move into the winter months, gloomy weather can be accompanied by gloomy expectations – especially if we listen to the news. Without God's laws there are no healthy relationships, no safe communities and there is no hope of justice. Now happiness and joy are different things. Happiness depends on circumstances – and lots of us are taking a hit from Covid – the bigger our families the more likely this is. However as believers in Jesus we can still have joy. We need to fight for joy and for

those of us who, through Jesus Christ, have a relationship with God we possess a Joy that is a constant – or should be.

In Psalm 27 which we heard earlier, the psalmist sings of love for the Lord and reliance upon him. The Psalm begins with "The Lord is my light and my salvation – why should I be afraid?" Light is an image of everyday life. In v 6 is written "Then I will hold my head high above my enemies who surround me . At his Tabernacle I will offer sacrifices with shouts of joy." Note that the Psalmist has joy in God in spite of being surrounded by enemies and before the coming of Jesus who brings a host of extra reasons to us, in the light of the New Testament, to have joy in God.

To hold Joy in God is easy to say, yet I find it hard to hold to on a permanent basis. So today I will preach to myself on the topic of "Facing Daily Difficulties with Jesus" – this is the dominant thought. Of course I am hoping that this will help some of you in the months ahead. I'll be looking at daily difficulties encountered by Jesus not all of which we will share because each person has their own list. Then I will look at three truths about Jesus that are also truths for us which enables the power of Jesus to be with us. I ask that you let these sink from our heads to our hearts as it's there that they make the difference. For those of you facing difficulties for which there is no quick fix, like Long Covid let us go back to the last verse of Psalm 27 where it says "Wait patiently for the Lord. Be brave and courageous. Yes wait patiently for the Lord." Sometimes we need to hold on to a long-term view to get us through our present troubles.

I have recently finished reading a secular book called 'Being Mortal'. The writer says this "We all require devotion to something more than ourselves for our lives to be meaningful. Without it we have only our desires that are fleeting, capricious and insatiable, leading ultimately, only to torment." As believers in Jesus we commit to things much bigger & better than ourselves & God accompanies us.

As said earlier, the dominant thought for today is facing everyday difficulties, and I will be using the life of Jesus to teach us how to do this. As groups & individuals we all have memorable highs and lows and so did Jesus – Mount of Transfiguration/ garden of Gethsemane. In the following moment think of a terrible time and then a wonderful time in your life. There is a temptation to divide our past lives into good things for which to be grateful and bad things to forget, which means we cannot move freely into the future - but that is a topic for another sermon!

For Jesus and for us, most of life is not at these extremes. What do we call it? A constant grind? A lifelong struggle? Plodding on through endless adversity? No – they are negatives we are people who believe in Jesus so we face them with Jesus. It is important for us to choose right thoughts. Where the mind goes, the person follows. Thoughts produce attitudes and perspectives which greatly influence the overall quality of our lives. As a candle gives light to the darkness. Knowing Jesus can give light to our inner being and give us right thoughts. With right thoughts in place, we can deal with things that happen - circumstances.

I have selected three areas of everyday difficulties that Jesus faced I am calling these – frustration with disciples; people pressure; and opposition. In our reading from Matthew chapter 15 Jesus shows real frustration with disciples (Some translations say 'why don't you understand?'; others 'why are you so dull?') – In Mark chapter 10 when James & John seek

favouritism Jesus displays genuine disappointment in his reply 'You do not know what you are asking'. The truth about sacrificial love has not dropped. Again and again the disciples of Jesus fail him.

Now to people pressure. For Jesus it was enormous. In Luke chapter 8 v 19 we are told "Once when Jesus' mother & brothers came to see him, they could not get near him because of the crowds." Those verses read to us from Mark give an insight into the demands on him and how he went off to a solitary place. So although Jesus was the perfect human, even he needed to escape the massive pressures from people.

Throughout the gospels Jesus encounters opposition -particularly from the religious We heard from Scripture in Mark 11 how his authority was questioned. In Mark 2 when teachers of the religious law see him eating with sinners and tax collectors, they accuse him of eating with scum. It is very testing indeed to meet with ingratitude and opposition when we are trying to do good, but we should expect it. As believers in Jesus we are told to be salt and light — salt stings as it heals and light reveals evil so as followers we cannot expect a quiet life.

Now as Christians we believe that death is not the end and Jesus proved it. A lot of scripture tells us to 're-fix our gaze'. Paul puts it this way in 2 Corinthians: "For we know that when this earthly tent is taken down – when we die & leave these bodies – we will have a home in heaven, an eternal body made for us by God himself and not by human hands." Yes, we have assurance of heaven, but this life on earth really matters so I will now talk about it. We all have our Strengths & weaknesses. (Mountains/ multi tasking. Walk and talk) Not only that. We all have times when we are strong and can give to others, and other times when we are weak & broken.

However, I must recognise that good fortune (in this world) is not shared equally. For many, tragedy suddenly becomes a reality in our lives. Phil Bosman puts it this way. "The inevitable happens, you lose your job, you get sick, you have an accident, a loved one dies, ..." Perhaps one of the hardest things is when a long term illness hits us and continues for decades. I have had a taste of that since I have had insulin dependent diabetes for 40 years. These, let's call these chronic conditions. They impact not only us, but those close to us – especially husbands, wives, partners, parents, children and friends. Our faith should assist us in coping with these daily difficulties. Some seem to manage without God. But we have faith in Jesus and that can really help us keep our heads above water, and live a full life. So let us look at His example.

<u>One</u>. Jesus needed others and so do we. A balance here. We must not be too proud to ask for help or so eager to get others to help that we fail to take action to help ourselves. One truth that Jesus found when needing help from others was that they let Him down – and that will happen to us – just as we fail others, so they will fail us. Jesus did not let these failings destroy Him and so we must try to follow Him in that way.

**Two.** On account of being God's son and being sinless Jesus had a close relationship with his father. Since Jesus has taken our sin away, that close relationship with God is available to us. A poem called Whistling in the Rain puts this well. How is it that some people sit in the sun looking like sour apples & that others whistle in the rain? How is it that there are people who, as soon as they open their eyes, see something wrong? It is because they don't understand the meaning of life, the meaning of things. They need God, not as an impersonal, hazy being somewhere far away

but as a personal friend, like a father close to them. By being on intimate terms with God people see things with new eyes and start every morning with a new heart.

Let us now stop and think about what it means to us to be a child of God.

<u>Three</u>. As Jesus was empowered by the Holy Spirit following his baptism — so are we, once we confess our sins and believe in Jesus. In Romans Chapter 5 Paul tells us Hope does not disappoint us because God has poured out his love into our lives by the Holy Spirit who is in us and never leaves us.

For anyone not sure who is the Holy Spirit, the Bible is a story of the one creator God who comes close to a special people the Jews, then closer by coming to all in Jesus, then to those who believe God comes to be actually within us. How I need to let that truth drop and stay in my heart. In the power of the Holy Spirit we can deal with things that happen -circumstances, BUT, we can diminish that power by either quenching or grieving that 3<sup>rd</sup> person of the Trinity. This is why in the beatitudes Jesus told us "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God." Our hearts are not pure when we have sinful thoughts which stick to us like flies stick to fly paper so we MUST deal with them.

So, to face everyday difficulties. We need to make sure we are not alone in our trials. To know that we are children of God and be empowered by the Holy Spirit at work in us.

We shall now sing 'Father hear the prayer we offer' which is no. 518 from StF. In it there are lines like 'not for ease' and 'the steep and rugged pathway' to reflect this theme of this service.
